Are ya feelin' Lucky? Do you feel \$558,630.00 lucky? A lucky Monterey fisherman was lucky; he found the egg. And yes, "One Way" paid off on the \$100.00. Water quality has improved exposing hundreds and hundreds of swimming minnows. The minnows are back and they are biting. On July 6th, water visibility was officially measured at 19 inches during a deep water test done by a Property Owner volunteer. "Lucky" and "Lots of Rocks" have been hot topics. Old Flattop over in the west side of the south bay was found; unfortunately, it was found by an unlucky boat. It is now marked with a rock buoy. GPS should keep its location known. It will have an "Ice Spar" on it come fall.

So, are ya feelin' lucky? That's the question to ask yourself before driving through the "Lots of Rocks" area of Bass Lake. That's the large area is the middle north quarter of the south bay. Many a rock waits there unmarked. Luckily, in the early 1960's Hobart boat and Ski Club members removed about all those rocks so they could put in a safe slalom course. It was an event. Many/maybe most of the club members walked the length of the north shoreline area of the south bay hand-in-hand. Every time the group stumbled onto a rock, it was hoisted off the lake bottom and placed on the pontoon boat that was trailing behind. The rock collection that appeared on the deck was then floated to deep water and pushed overboard. Thus, the birth of the safe Hobart slalom course. I remember that day. I actually remember that day every time I pull a skier in that "Rockless" section of lake. While driving through "Rockless", I always remain aware that just south remains the "Lot's of Rocks" area. "Old Scar" is in there. Four buoys are there too; some marking specific rock locations in the "Lots of Rocks" graveyard. That means, only a few of the many rocks are actually marked. So, let the driver beware. Still feel lucky? Well do you? If so, drive through "Lots of Rocks."

The Property Owners Annual Meeting marked 100 years since the formation of our Bass Lake Association. We discussed rocks, "Lots of Rocks", glacial stone and had an election too. Cindy Hunter and Rick Linkus are new board members; Kathy Laiter is our new Secretary. Also our by-laws were revised. The glacial stone grant application is on track for submission in January 2019. Check out the glacial stone in front of the Beach Pavilion and credit the Park Board. Healthy Shoreline Initiative—Why is there an effort to add glacial stone or bioengineered seawalls in front of the lake's concrete seawalls? When water hits a concrete wall, the wave that is produced



discourages healthy plants from growing and in turn impacts the fish population negatively. Our "early adopter" is Starke County; glacial stone was recently installed in front of the concrete seawall at the Bass Lake Beach. We will be applying for a Lake and River Enhancement (LARE) grant by January 31 that will provide money to interested property owners for 2019 glacial stone projects. We are creating a list of the property owners who are interested in doing this. Anticipated grant money would be made available in 2019 and would reimburse about 80% of the stone. Recycling at Bass Lake—Your property tax environmental assessment pays for the recycling bins behind the BLPOA building, which belong to Starke County. Note that there are cameras on these bins and people who use it for disposal other than recycling can be given a \$2,500 fine for each offense. Note: Please break down your cardboard boxes so we can recycle more efficiently. Currently, the bins are emptied twice a week. Note that Starke County has recently considered a county-wide recycling program but it does not seem likely to be implemented.

Lock Your Cars—The Neighborhood Watch Program is alive and well at Bass Lake. Each week the lake is patrolled by volunteers, who work closely with the Starke County Sheriff to keep our lake community safe. Note that last summer and this summer there have been car theft incidents; items that are loose in the car (spare change, chargers, etc.) have been taken. Get in the habit of locking your cars!

Bass Lake History—California Township Map



Submitted by Ron Vendl, Starke County Historical Society This 1876 map of California Township shows the Round Lake area and roads during the times discussed in the Old Settlers news articles. There are four one-room schools shown; Aldine, Geneseo, Spoor and White. They would have most likely still been of the log cabin type. The church shown is the Round Lake Church, which would have been of the United Brethren faith at that time. The creek is the Cedar Lake Outlet, one of the few natural streams in Starke County. It carried the overflow from both Round Lake and Bass Lake (Cedar Lake) over to the Kankakee River near a place called Governor's Island. Muskrat Mill was located at the asterisk just west of the township line on this same creek. Very few roads followed the section lines as we are accustomed. Instead they followed the sand ridges to avoid the swamps. A sharp eye will notice there were no roads where SR 10 and US 35 now run. A large swamp prevented direct travel between Bass Lake and Knox, and only small portions of Bass Lake had any sort of road.
