Constellation of Starke—We will receive \$333,000 for being a finalist in the 2019 Regional Stellar Communities Program. After analyzing the results from a recent survey, it was discovered that 60% of the 270 respondents wanted to see available funding spent on physical projects, as originally intended, rather than COVID-19 response efforts. During an Online Community Outreach Event on May 7th, information was provided about a multi-phase, county-wide improvement project. It is being developed based on past public input and the Regional Development Plan created during the Stellar process last year. ### Bass Lake History—Ora School

The Ora school was built in 1902 at a cost of \$4,000. In its early years it offered 3 years of high school up through 1931, but later offered elementary education up through the 8th grade. This former school building is one of a handful of school buildings still standing a century later. In 1961, Ora students were consolidated into the Culver School System.



The town of Ora, which had a population of 300 in 1915, was originally platted in 1882 when the Chicago & Atlantic Railroad (Erie) was built through Ora, Aldine, North Judson and Lomax. In days gone by, Ora had as many as 3 grocery stores, 2 churches, a drug store, a cheese factory, a pickle factory, an ice cream parlor, a newspaper, 3 saloons, 2 dance halls, 2 doctors and a post office (which exists to this day). 

Spring Flooding at Bass Lake—Overflowing streams sweep away whatever is in their paths, including dirt, dead leaves, rocks and fallen branches. If the flooding reaches lawns or fields, it will also pick up bacteria, oils, nutrients and other substances. These substances enter the waterway and are carried into Bass Lake. Once there, the fish, underwater plants and microorganisms are often negatively affected by the sudden addition of harmful substances. One cause of blue-green algae, for instance, is phosphorus, a nutrient found in fertilizer that can get washed into lakes during times of flooding. Lakes that receive polluted water may also see a decrease in fish life.

You can prepare today to preserve the health of your lake! Use nontoxic household products and properly dispose of hazardous household waste, such as electronics. Recycle used motor oil and maintain your car to keep oil, coolant, antifreeze or other chemicals from leaking onto the ground. Use only the fertilizer that your lawn needs by using phosphorus-free fertilizer applied at a rate based on soil testing. When another storm comes, the substances swept from your property will be much less harmful to Bass Lake.
