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
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President Rick Anderson's Thoughts

The lake only dropped one inch in July leaving the August 1 level at minus 4 inches. During July, I measured and recorded lake visibility using the DNR's secchi disk. All the readings I took had lake visibility at about 1.8 feet. For Bass Lake, that's kinda normal. The August Property Owner's meeting will be on August 20 as specified in our bylaws. Give our bylaws a read; they are only a few pages and can be found on our website (inbasslake.com) or in the middle of our directory. Bass Lake Conservancy District - Things have been quiet around the BLCD which indicates all is well. July rainfall was 6.5". This was the most July rainfall since 2017! The average July rainfall is 2.99", year-to-date is 20.9". In July, our lake pump added 37 million gallons of water to the lake, year-to-date is 161.4 million.

We recently had NIPSCO install LED lighting at both the lake pump and the main lift station, located at CRs 210 and 450 S., to reduce light pollution. The Asset Management Study is ongoing and proceeding nicely. The Study will give us direction for the needs to safely and economically run your sewer system for the next 5-10-20 years. Kaley Brother's Store—Kaley Brothers Store was located in "downtown" Winona on Bass Lake's northeast corner. In this 1905 photo postcard, it is advertised as the Marshall Field of Bass Lake. That might

have been an exaggeration, but it was a general store that carried a little bit of just about anything a person might want back around the turn of the last century. The Kaley's provided a new service to the lake area – a horse drawn delivery wagon.

John and Anna Kaley opened their store in the 1890's and ran it for more than thirty years. Daughters Lilah and Bulah are shown with their parents standing on the wood plank sidewalk.
