Bird Watching at Bass Lake

Dedicated bird watchers could expect to see more than 300 species of birds in the state annually. More than 420 species of birds have been documented in Indiana. Most of Indiana bird species are migratory, some may spend the entire year here, while others may spend only a third or less of their time in Indiana.

Common birds in the Bass Lake and Starke County area are mallard ducks, wood ducks, Canada geese, great blue herons, red-winged blackbirds, house sparrow, eastern bluebirds, hairy woodpeckers, American crow, eastern bluebirds, ruby-throated hummingbirds, Baltimore orioles, American robins, European starlings, eastern towhees, common grackles, song sparrows, Carolina wrens, indigo buntings, house wrens, American tree sparrows, northern flickers, barred owls, screech owls, great horned owls, red-tailed hawks, coopers hawks, kestrels, wild turkeys. Some common birds seen at backyard feeders include: tufted titmouse, purple finches, northern cardinals, mourning doves, house finches, red bellied woodpeckers, black-capped chickadees, blue jays, American goldfinches, downy woodpeckers, dark-eyed juncos, white throated sparrows, white-breasted nuthatches. Pictures of these birds can be easily found on the internet.

https://www.allaboutbirds.org/guide/search. On this website you can listen to bird calls which is a great way to identify birds without actually seeing them. Another good birding assistance resource is the Merlin Bird ID App. This App will record bird calls near you and then ID the bird by its calls. Local bird watching opportunities are available at Kankakee Fish & Wildlife Area 574-896-3522, Winamac Fish & Wildlife Area 574-242-4422, and Tippecanoe River State Park 574-946-3213. Contact these locations prior to a site visit to learn about bird watching opportunities and property rules and regulations. Van's Inn

Van's Inn was located at the south end of Bass Lake where The Brunch Pub is now located. Van's was a combination service station, bus stop and restaurant during the 1930's through the late 1950's.

Travelers on Indiana Motor Buses would have no doubt appreciated their facilities after the trip from Logansport. Their Bar-B-Q sandwiches were very popular with local residents. They also featured homemade pie and fountain service.

Motorists would have filled up with Sinclair H-C gasoline, the industry's first high octane premium gasoline, and topped their oil off with Sinclair Emerald Motor Oil. Gasoline was about 16 cents per gallon at the time of this photo. Before Van's Inn, this stop was Wolfe's Place. They also featured Bar-B-Q sandwiches.
