February - very rainy with flooding; March - ear muffs, hats & gloves; April's start - even colder. April 4 had white stuff on the ground, and an 18 degree April 8th morning had lake skim ice. "April snow make flowers grow?" Spring may be waiting for summer. Meanwhile: \$348,241 at the "V" and the 2018 egg is in. The Old Fish Hatchery, aka: "Hideout at the Fish Hatchery" is becoming the New Fish Hatchery as renovations are being completed by Purdue. By May 1, one pond is expecting bass and blue gill. A second pond will shortly follow intended for fish research.

The lake is spilling clearer waters over the dam. A trip to Double D's Bait & Tackle indicated that previously stocked walleye are growing. They were joined last month by 32,000 algae eating blue gill stocked by the DNR. Double D Dennis showed me a picture of a 16-inch bass just caught by another Dennis. The picture is on the wall joining other fish pictures. A 39-inch pike was caught last year as reported at the "V". Is the big one still out there? I will try to get a monthly fishing report from DD's; however, you can go on in and get your own report.

April 7 Property Owners Meeting: Lake health discussion on topics like - shoreline glacial stone is beneficial - avoid phosphate lawn fertilizers as runoff feeds algae and creates white foam - water testing is planned - and new membership, beautification and Starke County "Quality of Place" efforts. The 2018 Membership Form and Annual Letter will be going out by U.S. Mail May 1. May 19 is our first Registration Day with the 3rd Annual Pizza Party at 6:00 pm that evening. The February sanitary system overload has been isolated to 2 of 16 lift stations. Some sewer main camera testing has been completed. The Conservancy District Board is awaiting the report. I doubt any broken pipes will be identified. Back when Bass Lake sewers were being installed, would you believe a worker exclaimed, "Twenty-three, we cut twenty-three lake drains in just under a half mile. Where does that water go now?" If some are being illegally diverted to the sanitary system, my advice remains: Disconnect now and remain unknown.

Bass Lake Conservancy District—Rainfall for March totaled 1.21 inches. Also, an open position still exists for a District 1 Director (north end of the lake.) A contract company conducted camera inspections of selected sewer lines associated with lift stations O & P – the purpose was to identify what caused the continual running of the pumps during the February rains, Finally, the District had the ditch that handles the overflow from the weir cleared of limbs and scrubs. Golf Cart Inspection Dates—Sheriff's Dept. Golf Cart inspections at the POB will be on May 19, June 9 & June 23. At the time of the inspection, besides your golf cart you will need to bring the following items: the completed golf cart permit (downloaded from their website listed below, also on the Bass Lake Property Owners website); a copy of proof of liability insurance for the golf cart; and the annual fee of \$25.00 – cash or check made out to "Starke County". Starke County passed and adopted an ordinance that governs the operation of golf carts. The ordinance and operating permit can be viewed and obtained via their web site: http://www.co.starke.in.us/departments/sheriff/golf-cart-ordinance/. The Sheriff's Dispatch Center (574) 772-3771 can be contacted with questions and alternate inspection scheduling.

Healthy Shoreline Initiative—The BLPOA established a new work group, focusing on restoring our natural shoreline to preserve and enhance our water quality, prevent erosion, and provide healthier and safer habitat for the native creatures and lake life. We will be educating our property owners on healthy shoreline practices. In May, we will conduct a lake audit with Rod Edgell of the DNR, to determine where there are opportunities for glacial stone walls, as a healthy addition to a concrete seawall. We'll also work with Rod Edgell for our January 2019 LARE grant request, which will pay up to 80% of qualifying glacial stone projects. We be attending the Marshall County Shoreline Health event on April 19. Nathan Thomas, the DNR Lakes Permitting Biologist is the speaker. Finally, we will be working with Phil Woolery from the Purdue Starke County Extension Office on expanded monitoring under the Clean Lakes Program. This measures water clarity, phosphorus and chlorophyll (a measurement for algae).

Shoreline Health Class—Stabilization Techniques and Permitting—This information class is next week, featuring Nathan Thomas, Lakes Permitting Biologist Indiana DNR. It will be held on April 19, from 7:00—8:30 p.m. at the Wild Rose Moon in downtown Plymouth, 115 N. Michigan Street. The class is free and will discuss what a healthy shoreline is and the pros and cons of various seawalls. For more information, info@marshallcountyswcd.org, (574) 936-2024 x3.

With Spring Here, It's Time to Think About Tree Care—The month of April has both Abor Day and Earth Day. If you have any tree questions, contact Phil Woolery at the Extension office (574) 772-9141. An Ag and Natural Resources Educator, Phil is a Certified Arborist and would be able to answer your questions or to inspect your trees. He also happens to reside at the Bass Lake Hatchery with this family!

This proper care starts before the tree has been planted. When selecting a tree, you need to check if the mature size of the tree will fit in the planting location. This will eliminate costly pruning when the tree outgrows its space. One of the most important things for planting is planting depth. Planting a tree too deep will decrease growth and long-term survival. Before you dig the planting hole, you want to find the first roots coming off the trunk. You might have to dig some of the soil to find the root, but this should be at the soil level. For a copy of Phil's full article about tree care,

The Woodlawn Hotel—This article is a continuation of last month's historical focus on the Woodlawn Hotel. This photo of the Woodlawn Grocery Store which was located on the east (right) side of the Woodlawn Hotel picture (at the intersection of S. CR 210 and 625 E.) This building, facing 625 E, became the first Fingerhut Bakery location on Bass Lake probably sometime in the very early 1960's. Eventually, the Woodlawn Hotel Grocery sign was replaced with a Fingerhut Bakery sign, according to Diane Blais, a frequent visitor to the bakery when she was a child. *Ron Vendl, Starke County Historical Society*
