

Rocks in Bass Lake—New residents of our lake might not know where the rocks in the lake are. From a safety and boat protection standpoint, you'll want to avoid them. In the past the rocks that are easily removed have been taken out of the lake. The ones that are too large have been "sunk" deeper so they are less of a hazard. The rocks that remain and are dangerous and most are marked with buoys. There will be a rock overview by our BLPOA President after the next BLPOA meeting (July 7, 9:00 a.m.) if you are interested in learning more or email kcarrier@briljent.com for a laminated rock map.

Golf Cart Inspection Dates—The final Sheriff's Department Golf Cart inspection at the BLPOA Building will be on June 23. At the time of the inspection, besides your golf cart bring the following items: the completed golf cart permit (downloaded from their website listed below, also on the Bass Lake Property Owners website); a copy of proof of liability insurance for the golf cart; and the annual fee of \$25.00 – cash or check made out to "Starke County". Bass Lake Conservancy District—The directorship positions serving District I and At-Large expire at the end of the month. The District I position is for one year term expiring in 2019. The At-Large position is for a four year term expiring in 2022. To be valid, nominating petitions must have been submitted to the Conservancy District Office, in writing before June 1, 2018. There were no nominating petitions for District I. Incumbent Russ Blais submitted a nominating petition for the At-Large directorship position. Therefore there will be no election. Healthy Shoreline Initiative—The BLPOA has a committee focused on restoring our natural shoreline to preserve and enhance our water quality, prevent erosion, and provide a healthier and safer habitat for fish. On June 4, Nate Thomas (permit specialist) and Rod Edgell (grant specialist) met with lake volunteers to answer questions about permits and grants for glacial stone seawall projects. Our "early adopter" is Starke County; glacial stone will soon be installed in front of the concrete seawall at the Bass Lake Beach. We will be applying for a Lake and River Enhancement (LARE) grant by January 31 that will provide money to interested property owners for 2019 glacial stone projects. Bass Lake History—Aldine School

A photo of Aldine's one-room school is dated 1908. Located about four miles south-west of Bass Lake on the former Erie Railroad line, Aldine was founded in 1882. By the turn of the last century, it was a

thriving community of 100 people, with several stores, a post office, Gleaner Hall, church, school and railroad facilities. This particular school building was built in 1894 and was known as the "Frog Pond School". Miss Anna Marie Tracy was the teacher in this photo. Her wages were \$2.39 per day. A North Judson girl, she roomed and boarded with Mrs. Lewis German of Aldine during the week. *Ron Vendl, Starke County Historical Society*
